bachelor's degree at the Ohio State University and master's degree from the University of Southern California, Medical degree from the University of Miami (Fla), Juris Doctor degree from Southwestern

San Diego. He has practiced in South-Central Los Angeles for over 2 decades and was on faculty at the University of California (Irvine) for 37 years. Dr. Bitonte has served as president of the Los Angeles County Medical Association, president of the California Society of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, president of the City of Los Angeles Commission on Disability and president of the American Academy of Legal Medicine. Meghan E. Brooks is an Assistant Professor of Law at the University of South Carolina School of Law, and the Director of the Veterans Legal Clinic. Professor Brooks teaches Administrative Law and public benefits, and her work focuses on veterans' law and agency adjudication more generally. Professor Brooks was the Robert M. Cover Fellow in the Veterans Legal Services Clinic at Yale Law School. Prior to that, she was a Justice Catalyst Fellow in the Veterans Benefits and Special Litigation Units at New York Legal Assistance Group, where she represented veterans and their families in benefits appeals. 
Davida Finger, Clinic Professor and Law Clinic Director, has taught the Community Justice section of the Law Clinic, Externship course, and the Law & Poverty course. Her scholarship interests include poverty law, clinical education, community lawyering, access to justice, delivery of legal services, housing, and post-disaster government accountability. She and her clinic students represent on cases such as landlord-tenant, post-disaster housing, housing discrimination, and on other civil rights matters. In addition to litigating cases, Professor Finger strives to provide support and collaboration on community advocacy for anti-

poverty and justice initiatives. Professor Finger serves as the Rene August and Mary Jane Pastorek Distinguished Clinical Professor of Law. She also serves as Director of the Gillis Long Poverty Law Center. The U.S. State Department has named Professor Finger a Fulbright Specialist, an honor that will allow her to continue to teach at the College of Law while being available as a specialist to Fulbright institutions through 2026. Professor Finger's empirical research on housing justice presented the first comprehensive look at the eviction crisis in New Orleans. In 2020, the Clinical Legal Education Association (CLEA) named Professor Finger co-editor of the Best Practices blog, which grew out of CLEA's best practices committee and serves as an information hub on current reforms in legal education. While in law school, Professor Finger was the founding Editor in Chief of the Seattle Journal for Social Justice and an Associate Editor on the Seattle University Law Review. At graduation, she received the Faculty Scholar Award for excellence in high academic achievement and substantial service to the law school community. In 2007, Seattle University Law School named her an inspiring alum.



Jacqueline Fox is a professor of law at the Joseph F. Rice School of Law at the University of South Carolina. She received her JD and LLM from Georgetown University, was a postdoctoral Greenwall Fellow at Johns Hopkins and Georgetown Universities, and a Donaghue Visiting Scholar in Research Ethics at Yale University. She recently completed a Fulbright Global Scholar fellowship at the Uehiro Centre for Practical Ethics at Oxford University and Melbourne Law School. Her research interests focus on the intersection of the law and policy of healthcare financing mechanisms and bioethics. Her current project is a comparative

study of methods used to calculate the amount of money spent on healthcare and how these methods can do harm and good.

for the Nursing Knowledge Big Data Science (NKBDS) Initiative's Learning Collaborative for Digital Health Workgroup. She has been selected for induction as a Fellow in the American Academy of Nursing for October 2025.



Robert R. Harrison is an Adjunct Associate Professor at the University of Utah S.J. Quinney College of Law. He teaches courses in health care law and policy, health care regulation, regulatory law, and professional ethics; directs the Colloquium in Law and Biomedical Sciences; and serves on the University Institutional Review Board. Professor Harrison is a graduate of the University of Richmond, the Medical College of Virginia at Virginia Commonwealth University, and the Saint Louis University School of Law. He was a Fellow at the Beazley Institute for Health Law and Policy at Loyola University Chicago, earning a Master of Laws

in Health Law with a concentration in regulatory compliance, and holds a doctorate in Bioethics from the Loyola University Chicago Stritch School of Medicine. His academic interests focus on issues at the intersection of regulatory law and ethics in human subjects research, health policy and medical professionalism. Recent selected works are published in Theoretical Medicine and Bioethics, Ethics and Human Research, the Journal of Law, Medicine and Ethics, and the Journal of Health Care Compliance. He is currently researching a book about unconsented experiments conducted by the United States Public Health Service in Guatemala from 1946 to 1948. Professor Harrison served for seven years on the faculty of the Virginia Commonwealth University School of Medicine, was Senior Counsel at the Johns Hopkins Health System, and taught bioethics at the University of Texas Rio Grande School of Medicine, where he held an appointment as Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Internal Medicine. He is a past Chair of the Health Law Section of the Federal Bar Association, a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives, and a Fellow and President-Elect of the American Academy of Legal Medicine.



Heather W. Miller is an accomplished health lawyer with over a decade of experience as in-house counsel for hospitals and health systems. She currently serves as AVP, Senior Corporate Counsel for MultiCare Health System and is based out of Raleigh, NC. As a trusted in-house partner, Heather has counseled corporate clients on a wide range of legal matters impacting health systems, including complex transactions, corporate governance, fraud and abuse, privacy and data use, pharmacy compliance, 340B, HIPAA, patient matters, and clinical research. Eleanor Morales is responsible for directing the Veterans Legal Clinic. Professor Morales joined the Army Judge Advocate General (JAG) Corps in 2010, upon graduation from Wake Forest School of Law. During her time on active duty, she served as a legal assistance attorney, criminal prosecutor, and administrative law attorney. Professor Morales also deployed to Kabul, Afghanistan, where she served as an operational law attorney in support of the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) and U.S. forces. In 2015, Professor Morales transitioned to the Army Reserves where she currently serves as an Army judge advocate in the

rank of Lieutenant Colonel. In 2018, Professor Morales was awarded the General Douglas MacArthur Leadership Award, an honor that is presented to fewer than 30 Army junior officers each year. She has most recently worked as an Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Department of Justice (DOJ) for five years. In that role, she was awarded the Department of Justice Director's Award for Superior Performance as a criminal Assistant U.S. Attorney (AUSA) in 2019. Under Professor Morales' guidance and supervision, the Wake Law Veterans Legal Clinic received the Clinical Legal Education Association (CLEA) Award for Excellence In a Public Interest Case or Project in 2024. The CLEA Award recognizes clinical work that effectively calls attention to and significantly redresses a high-priority need of underserved or low-income residents or communities and makes a notable contribution to the advancement of civil rights, civil liberties, human rights or legal services for the underrepresented. The award was given in honor of the work the Veterans Legal Clinic did to secure a Purple Heart, an Honorable discharge, comprehensive VA healthcare, and tax-free VA disability compensation for Private James Brown, a veteran who was unjustly denied these benefits for over 70 years. Morales' scholarship analyzes the intersection of military justice and veterans disability law. Her work has been published in the Duke Law Journal, the Connecticut Law Review and the Army Lawyer. She is also a fellow with the National Institute of Military Justice.



Macaulay Morrison is the Assistant Director for the Carolina Health Advocacy Medicolegal Partnership (CHAMPS) Clinic. Macaulay represents low-income children and their families in civil matters that address the social determinants of health and collaborates with partners at Prisma Health. Prior to joining the CHAMPS Clinic, Macaulay was the Legislative Resource Attorney for the Joint Citizens and Legislative Committee on Children. In this role she worked with policymakers, service providers and stakeholders to identify the most pressing needs of children in the state and to make policy and legislative recommendations

to improve the lives of South Carolina's youngest citizens. Macaulay has a law degree from the University of South Carolina School of Law and a B.S. from Clemson University. While in law school, Macaulay earned her Children's Law Concentration Certificate and worked with the South Carolina Department of Education and in the South Carolina Attorney General's Sexually Violent Predator Division and was a student attorney in the Education Rights Clinic. Katherine Taylor Pearson is a distinguished nursing informaticist, educator, and retired U.S. Army Colonel with over three decades of service in federal healthcare leadership. She currently serves as an Assistant Professor at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center School of Nursing, where she leads graduate-level coursework in project management, public health informatics, and cybersecurity. Her passion lies in advancing the nursing profession through innovation, mentorship, and the integration of technology into clinical practice and education. Dr. Pearson earned her Doctor of Nursing Practice in Executive Leadership from the

University of Alabama at Birmingham and an MSN in Nursing Informatics from the University of Maryland, Baltimore. She is ANCC board-certified in nursing informatics and holds multiple additional certifications including Certified Professional in Health Information Management Systems (CPHIMS), Lean Six Sigma Black Belt, and Certified Knowledge Manager.
